library after school) and borrow some books by an author you've not read before. Can you find any books about weather or plants?

Be a mathematician

Practise your counting by counting objects in a set. How many toy cars do you have? Check that all the pieces of a puzzle are in a box. How many baked beans are on your plate?! Think about how to count carefully and take care when you get to the tens numbers e.g. 39, 40.
